Proper Prior Planning Prevents Pitifully Poor Performance

- o Learn new skills
- o Learn about your child's disability—how does disability affect child's ability to learn
- o Learn about effective educational practices
- o Learn about legal rights and responsibilities
- o Learn how to measure your child's educational progress
- o Learn about tests and measurements
- o Learn to negotiate and persuade

Parents as Project Managers

- Need a road map—A Master Plan
- o Your vision for your child
- o Independent, self sufficient member of community
- o Determine your mission—why do you need to advocate
- o List Child's strengths and weaknesses
- o Set Long –Term goals with strategies to meet goals and establish time-line
- o Anticipate problems and prepare for future
- o Set goals in both academic and non-academic areas- concise yet flexible

If you do not plan you have to deal with the outcome

School and related professionals are a resource –experts with expertise in their respective fields. They will not have all the answers.

Changes in IDEA law have given parents more decision-making power when developing sp-ed program
